Historical Context:

Sited in the original Farnborough village. Formerly the Alma Inn it was renamed in the 19th century when the Empress bought Farnborough Convent. The rear of the building is 16th century timber-frame construction.

It was leased by the Simonds family in the 1850s. In 1860 more land became available and the Simonds bought the inn and adjoining land and built stables and a large yard. Opposite, adjacent to the railway they built a beer bottling plant served by the railway. This bottling plant produced 1000s of bottles, which were transported to the Camp, and soon all the inns and beer houses in Farnborough came under the Simonds name and displayed the company sign of the Hop Leaf.

This building is included on the List of Buildings of Local Significance due to its high evidential, historic, aesthetic and community values.
